

Mission

WILDD's mission is to unleash the gifts of dyslexic children and adults so they may achieve the full potential they deserve and of which they are capable; through identification, remediation, support, outreach, community education and advocacy.

WILDD works to move individuals with dyslexia from isolation and frustration to independence and equal footing with their peers.

WILDD clients are our family members, co-workers, and neighbors!



WILDD is a non-profit organization that provides one-on-one evidence-based academic therapy and resiliency-building for children and adults with specific learning disabilities/dyslexia; twenty percent of the U.S. population. The unique method employed by WILDD remediates language deficits and creates learning and living independence that allows individuals with dyslexia/specific learning disabilities to achieve success and compete with their peers in school, higher education, the workforce and life.



WILDD is a non-profit organization that addresses reading disabilities, particularly those associated with dyslexia—an estimated fifteen to twenty percent of the population—through four programs:

1. WILDD OUTREACH PROGRAM

The goal of the Outreach Program is to educate the public about dyslexia and learning disabilities. The program is designed specifically to dispel dangerous myths about the disability that contribute to inequality in education and employment, as well as to inform the public that individuals can overcome the disability, successfully complete school, and take advantage of post-secondary educational opportunities that will lead to gainful employment.

These goals are met through the delivery of public and private workshops imparting knowledge and expertise about dyslexia. Workshop attendees are provided information about the prevalence of dyslexia, current definitions, associated deficits and early indicators, the impact on individuals with dyslexia and their families, available community agencies and systems, and the best scientific, research-based practices to alleviate the negative impact of dyslexia/ specific learning disabilities while enhancing the positive impact of the unique learning styles and capabilities of individuals with dyslexia. The goals of the Outreach Program are also met through media designed to create awareness, including, but not limited to, brochures, websites, fundraising events, social media, and billboards.

2. WILDD DIAGNOSTIC PROGRAM

The goal of WILDD's Diagnostic Program is to identify individuals who are facing the challenges of undiagnosed dyslexia and other literacy problems, to determine the best path of remediation and academic therapy for individual clients, and to help empower clients with self-awareness so they can identify and utilize their strengths. When provided with a diagnosis, individuals identified with learning disabilities/dyslexia are permitted access to the necessary academic therapy needed to overcome the disability, as well as the needed support from schools and post-secondary institutions. Diagnostic results enable a determination of the best path of remediation and related services for individuals, where individualized programs can be developed to remediate the individual's academic deficits, increase their confidence, and improve their self-esteem.

WILDD achieves these goals through the provision of neuro-educational assessments using the most current individualized standardized diagnostic tools administered by WILDD's diagnostic team, which is headed by clinical psychologists.

3. WILDD ACADEMIC THERAPY PROGRAM

The goal of the Academic Therapy Program is to assist children and adults with dyslexia in moving from the frustration and isolation with which they live, to the independence and peer equality they deserve, and of which they are capable. This independence enables individuals with dyslexia/specific learning disabilities to achieve success and compete with their peers in school, higher education, and the workforce.

WILDD achieves this goal through the provision of the CLASS™ methodology; a scientific, research-driven, evidence-based, academic therapy intervention, developed by a special education teacher, to remediate individuals' reading, spelling, written expression, and math deficits, create self-awareness, and build resiliency. The methodology creates new neurological pathways in the brain and improves overall language processing functions. WILDD's ability to achieve this goal is enhanced with the use of WILDD Global™, a collaborative platform that enables the multisensory CLASS™ methodology to be delivered face-to-face, in real time, anywhere in the world.

4. WILDD TEACHER TRAINING PROGRAM

The goal of the Teacher Training Program is to empower fellow educators with a deeper understanding of the structure of the English language and provide them with knowledge and experience in utilizing an effective methodology that explicitly and effectively teaches individuals to efficiently interact with their language. WILDD also provides professional consultation services, which assist Wisconsin schools in meeting requirements of Wisconsin's Specific Learning Disabilities (SLD) Rule and other mandated reading and instructional standards.

WILDD achieves this goal through training teachers within public and private pre-kindergarten12th grade institutions, community and technical colleges, correctional facility educational programs, and four-year colleges and universities. Trainees are provided with instruction that enables them to effectively employ the CLASS™ methodology with their students and to gain the
same results that WILDD's Academic Therapy clients experience. Trainees are required to master the methodology through rigorous college-level course work that leads to certification in
CLASS™.

Changing Lives

WILDD provided 36,162 hours of one-on-one academic therapy to children and adults from all walks of life in the 2015-2016 fiscal year. Additionally, through its Teacher Training, Outreach, and Diagnostic Programs, WILDD has had a positive impact on more than 500 individuals' lives.

WILDD is committed to supporting our disabled veterans so they may support their families.

WILDD has been working with disabled veterans since opening our doors in 2005. Co-founder Erv Carpenter is a disabled veteran who is highly committed to helping men and women in the military.

The military is a common place for people with dyslexia/specific learning disabilities to find a home—a place where they can, and often do, succeed. But if they become disabled in the line of duty and begin looking for work, they have a compounded challenge because of their inability to read or write at a level commensurate with their intellect. WILDD works with the Department of Veteran's Affairs to remediate the reading, writing and, sometimes, math deficits of our nation's dyslexic disabled veterans—allowing them to engage in the life they deserve. WILDD is now working with Veterans Affairs departments in two states: Wisconsin and Illinois.

As of July, 2015 WILDD has the support of the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Veterans Affairs, Mr. John Sococs, and the head of his administrative staff, Mr. Ken Grant. Secretary Sococs's Letter of support for WILDD shows the importance that the State Veterans Administration places on assisting Veterans who struggle with dyslexia.

WILDD loves working with children and adults in Madison, Wisconsin, and around the globe through its one-on-one, real time, on-line program: WILDD Global™.



WILDD knows learners with dyslexia are gifted with the power to see possibilities: different ways of doing things. That's why so many successful entrepreneurs, artists and business owners are dyslexic.

WILDD's own leader lived with the challenges of dyslexia and envisioned a world where everyone with access to the Internet could tap into WILDD's successful CLASS™ method of academic therapy, so he designed the WILDD Global™ system.
